





## **WORKING, YET POOR IN ONTARIO**

March 2006

### **COMMUNITY ACTION GUIDE**

This guide contains ideas for ways that **YOU** can take action in your community on the information provided in "Working, Yet Poor in Ontario: A Call for Fair Wages and Working Conditions".

#### SHARE AND DOCUMENT STORIES

#### Hold a workers' rights event in your community.

- Invite a speaker from a legal clinic to talk about workplace rights or a speaker from your local labour council to talk about organizing to improve wages and working conditions.
- Document the experiences of workers in your community. Are people earning adequate wages and working in safe and respectful jobs? What are the problems?
- Write up your findings and use it as a tool to work for change. Use the first-hand experience of workers to encourage your political representatives and local employers to make needed improvements.

#### ORGANIZE!

# Talk to workers in your community who are affected by low wages and poor working conditions.

- Outreach to low-wage workers at Employment Insurance offices, Employment Resource Centres, Job Finding Clubs, mosques, churches, and community centres in low-income neighbourhoods.
- Invite workers to a community meeting to plan a collective strategy to improve wages and working conditions.
- Ask legal clinics, labour councils or social justice groups to work with you.

#### Expose illegal workplace practices in your community.

- With the permission and involvement of affected workers distribute information at workplaces where workers are experiencing violations of their rights.
- Call on the Ministry of Labour and demand that they investigate and take action.

#### MEET WITH LOCAL GOVERMENT

#### Meet with your city councilor.

- Use first-hand experiences and the information in the "Working Yet Poor" bulletin to highlight how workers in your community are being affected.
- Organize to pass a resolution at city hall that calls on the provincial government to improve and enforce the Employment Standards Act.
- Organize actions to show the impact of poor wages and working conditions and and follow-up with your demands to ensure they are met.

#### Lobby your local MPP.

- Let your MPP know that workers in your community need the *Employment Standards Act* to be updated and enforced.
- Use the list of demands and worker's stories to educate your local MPP and get his/her support for resources to make changes to the law and to ensure that the law is enforced.
